



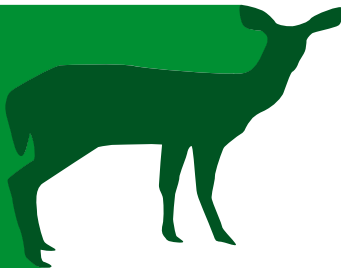

Welcome to the 7th International Pathways Human Dimensions of Wildlife Conference which also is the first Pathways Conference to be held in Europe. While other parts of the world still enjoy vast wilderness areas, nature in Europe has long been domesticized by humans. Just over the past two decades, long-term conservation efforts have shown success and some parts of the former wilderness are recovering and returning. Most dominantly, large carnivores like brown bear, wolf and lynx have received a lot of public attention and represent this year's conference theme: "Resurrecting the Wild!?" which is accompanied by both exclamation and question mark to illustrate the lively discussions that are taking place throughout Europe from Scandinavia to Sicily.

We have tried our best to identify research efforts and case studies in all parts of Europe to provide a common rooftop under the field of human dimensions or, more lately, conservation social science. We think it is important to bring together researchers and practitioners to identify the challenges that are associated with protecting, managing and harvesting wildlife. Clearly, a better understanding and integration of the human aspects of wilderness and wildlife issues could contribute to achieving global conservation objectives, to enhancing the management of game, wildlife and protected areas, and to fostering co-existence between humans and wildlife. Because of our common objectives yet diverse cultural backgrounds, we should make use of the opportunity to learn not only from our European neighboring countries, but also in a global context where issues that seem novel to many Europeans have been addressed for a much longer period of time.

Who wouldn't think that experiences from e.g. African or Asian wildlife managers could provide a more solid understanding when it comes to dealing with the return of the wolf to Central Europe?

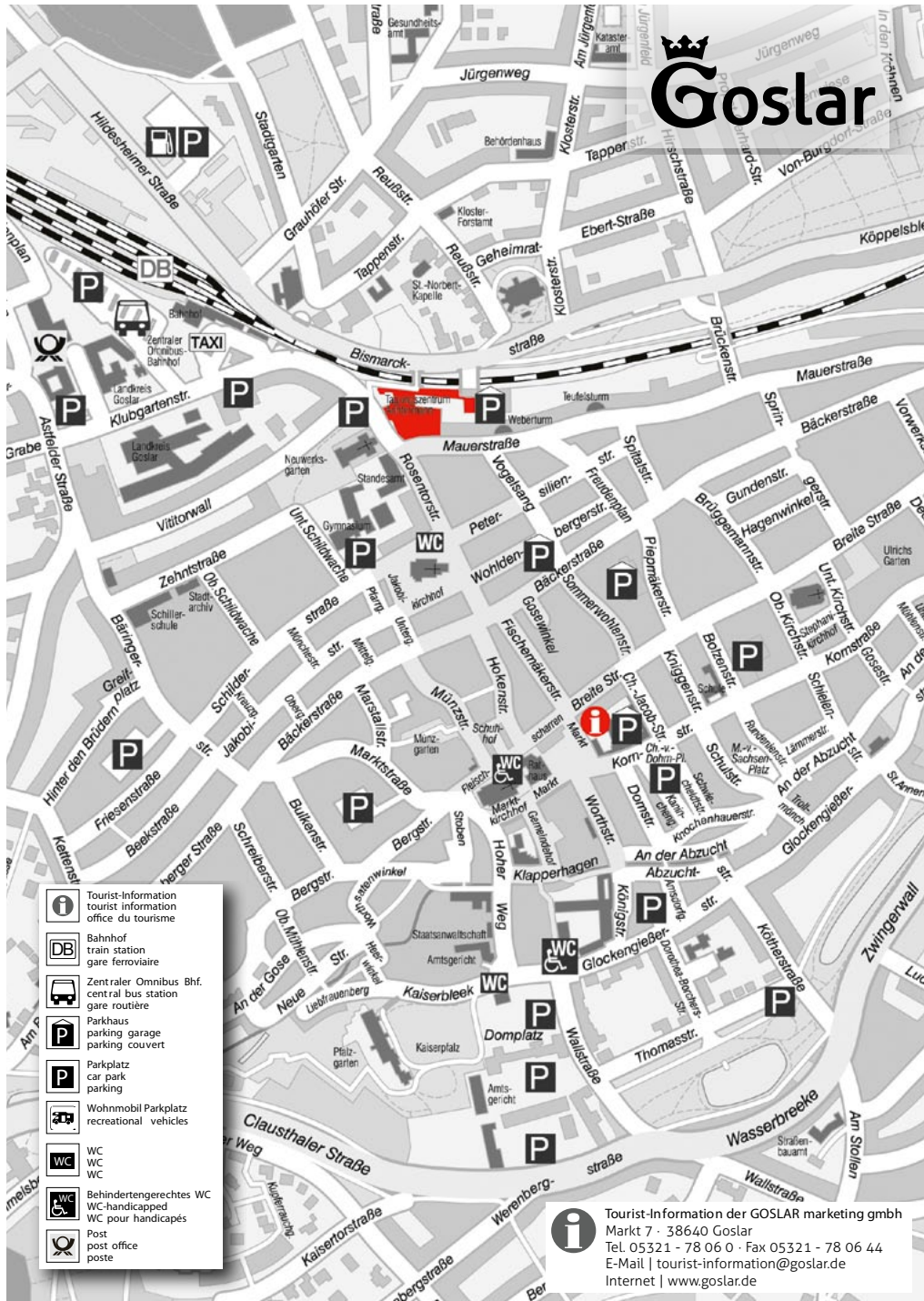

### The Leibniz Institute for Zoo & Wildlife Research

The Leibniz Institute for Zoo & Wildlife Research (Leibniz-IZW) is an internationally renowned wildlife research institute and a member of the German Leibniz Association with a broad interdisciplinary expertise in evolutionary ecology and genetics, ecological dynamics, wildlife diseases, reproductive biology and management. We study the diversity of life histories and evolutionary adaptations of free-ranging and captive wildlife species, their interactions with people and the environment and their resilience to global change. ### LIFE EuroLargeCarnivores

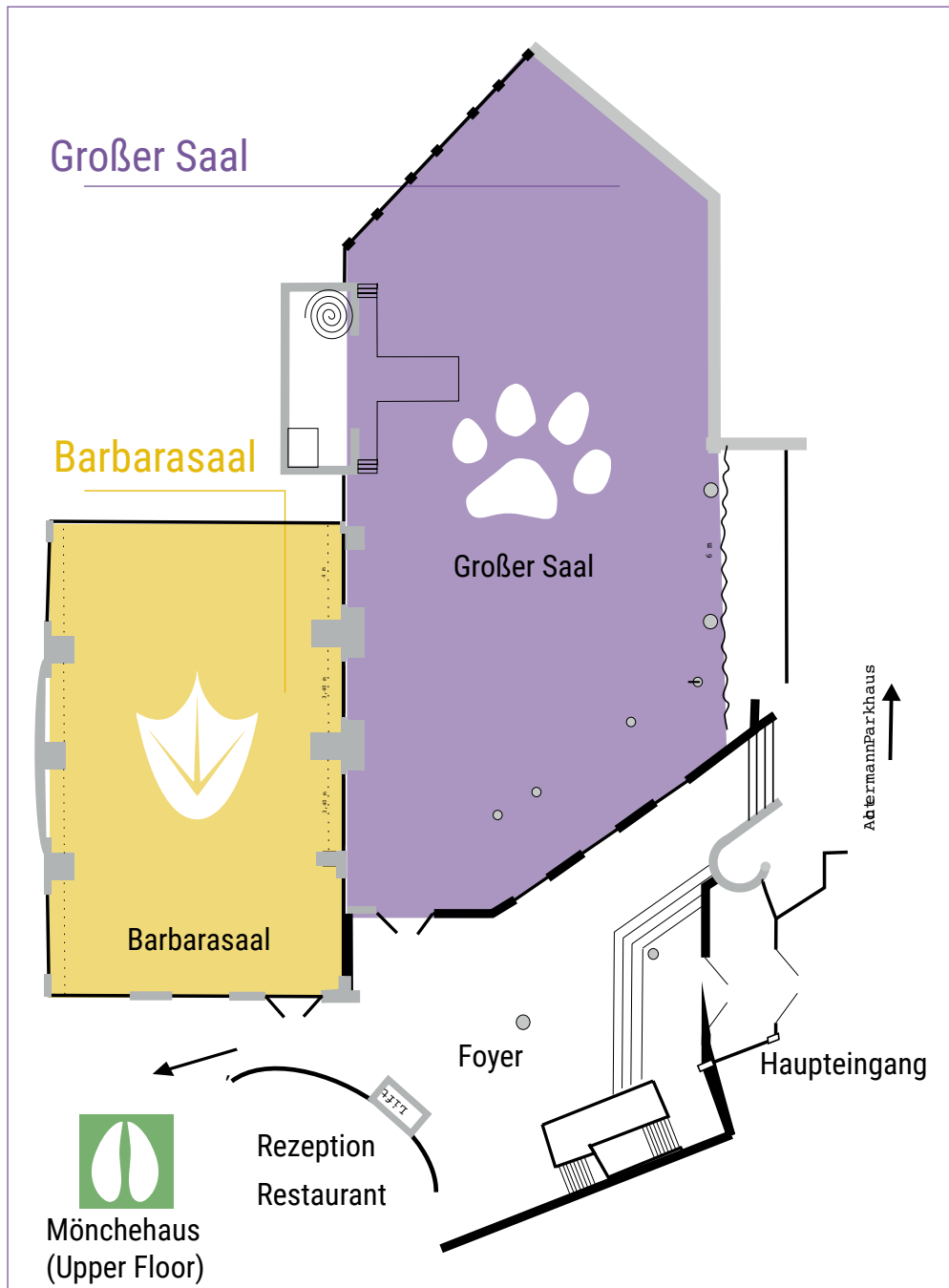

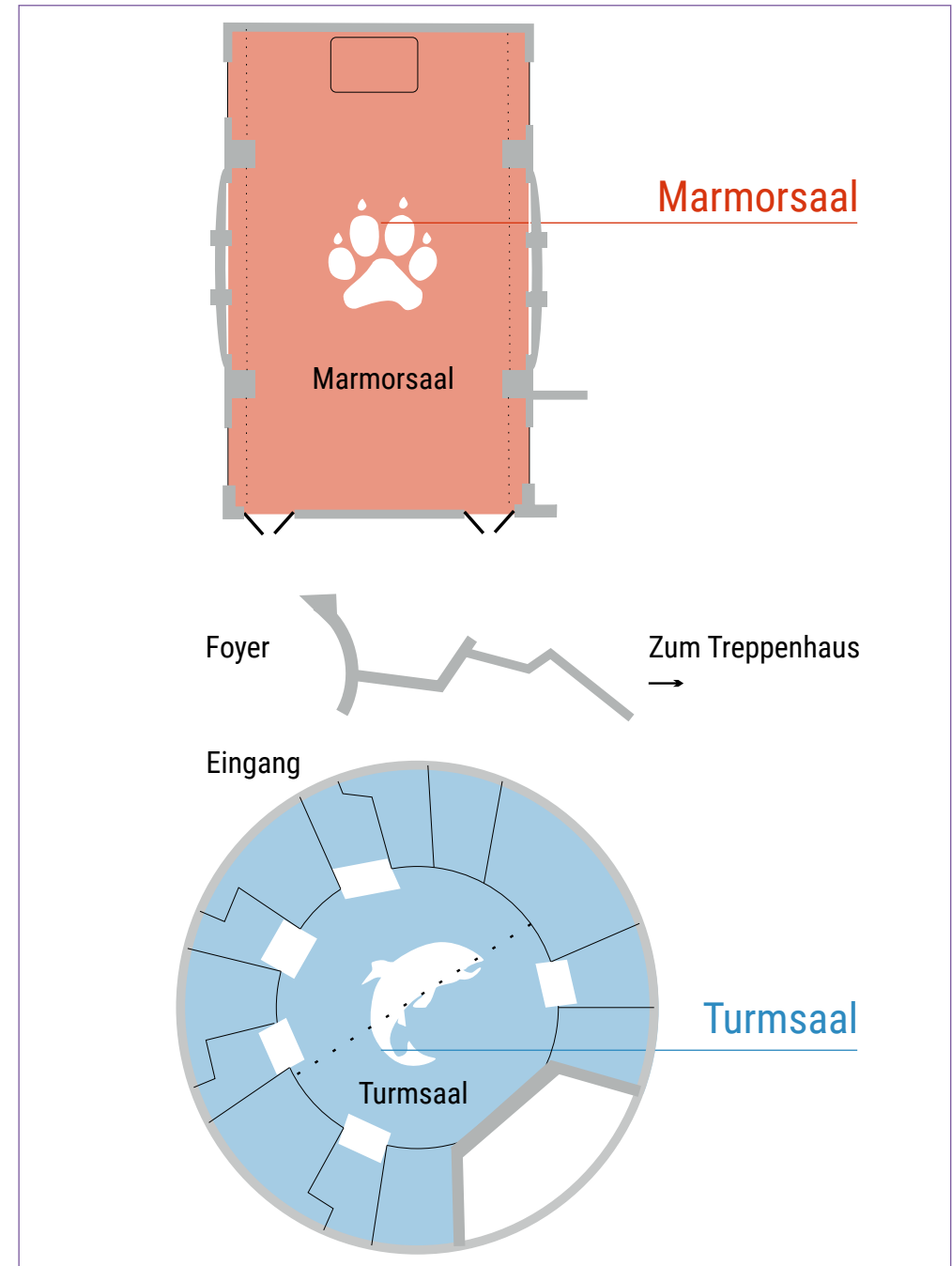
